## **Investment Objective**

The Fund's investment objective is to provide the unit holder with income and capital growth, by investing mainly in euro-denominated bonds of developed economies, in liquidity products, and to a lesser extent (no more than 10% of its assets) in shares. The Fund is actively managed and its purpose is to provide investors with long-term capital growth.

#### **Investment Strategy**

The fund mainly invests in fixed interest securities in euro, issued by EU countrymembers, organizations, financial institutions and corporations. The fund seeks to maximize total return and is not tethered to any benchmark. The investment team is focused on fundamental analysis to generate investment ideas, but also monitors the short-term movements of the market and conduct ongoing review of portfolio performance and risk characteristics.



#### **Q1 Commentary**

The inauguration of Donald Trump as U.S. president and the subsequent policy uncertainty prevailed throughout the first quarter of 2025. Tariff announcements were almost a daily occurrence, with immediate market reactions. The potential economic impact and ambiguity surrounding the outcomes of several trade reviews weighed heavily on sentiment. Confidence in the U.S. economy, in particular, bore the brunt of this uncertainty. By the end of the quarter, estimates projected negative GDP growth for the U.S. in Q1, while rising inflation expectations sparked concerns over stagflation. Optimism, however, remained strong in certain regions, most notably in Europe, supported by plans for significant fiscal loosening. A more proactive fiscal stance also lifted hopes for economic recovery in China.

Central banks remained vigilant amid the uncertain outlook but continued with a data-dependent approach while awaiting greater clarity. The Federal Reserve kept the federal funds target range unchanged at 4.25%–4.50% during the first quarter. The European Central Bank continued its monetary easing efforts, cutting rates at both the January and March meetings, while the Governing Council reiterated that the disinflation process was "well on track."

Core developed market sovereign yields rose in Q1—except for U.S. Treasuries, which experienced the steepest declines. Ten-year U.S. Treasury bond yields surged by approximately 120 basis points from their September lows to around 4.8% on January 14, 2025, amid strong U.S. growth expectations and a hawkish Federal Reserve stance in December, which signaled fewer rate cuts. However, yields declined thereafter due to signs of a slowing U.S. economy. Meanwhile, 10-year German Bund yields remained relatively range-bound in January and February, but posted their biggest single-day jump since 1990 on March 5, 2025, following Germany's announcement of major defense investments.

In credit markets, global high-yield (HY) spreads widened the most during Q1 2025, primarily driven by an increase in U.S. HY spreads. In contrast, global investment-grade (IG) spreads remained largely stable, with U.S. IG widening and euro-denominated IG tightening. January saw spread compression across both IG and HY in USD and EUR credit markets. However, U.S. HY spreads widened significantly in March.

TRITON Income Fund posted a negative return of -0.56% in Q1 2025, outperforming its reference benchmark, which returned -0.90%
